What I love about Switzerland is its people power. We are a truly direct democracy with referenda and initiatives. We can vote on anything: on working hours, VAT, speed limits, military jets, new hospitals, schools, roads, opening hours of local shops – just anything! There's a real sense of being involved in making our own laws, our own community, our country.

Whenever I go back, I'm amazed how diverse, vibrant and creative Switzerland is. We have 26 regions called *cantons* and four national languages: Swiss German, French, Italian and Romansch.

But I do have to mention a cliché: I never leave Switzerland without a stash of my favourite Lindor chocolate.

Valeria Melchioretto's poem 'From the Intestines of a Mystical Dog' talks about a Swiss watch in a wonderfully original, quite unusual way – a real testament to creative Switzerland.
